# **Quest for Peace**

**FEDICAMP**: Two successive years of drought have devastated farmers across Central America. Our partners at FEDICAMP are assisting those farmers by providing training in practical agricultural techniques that allow them to maintain a productive harvest even with minimal rainfall. The FEDICAMP *promoteres* have spread the word about drought-resistant fruits and vegetables, the importance of crop diversification, and organic methods of production.

"Despite the drought, my plot has yielded black beans, fruit and vegetables. What has motivated me to think and act this way was the food shortage as well as FEDICAMP's exchanges and workshops...[where] we share successful experiences with one another because among farmers we talk and practice in a simple way, sharing good ideas as well as lending native seed when the other one needs it." - Orlando, 59 (San Antonio, Nicaragua)

These families are on the front lines of climate change, and their "campesino-a-campesino" (neighbor to neighbor) model of sharing successful sustainable farming methods is having a major impact on families living on the edge of subsistence. at the Institute of John XXIII and a ground-breaking agreement with Banpro, Nicaragua's largest bank (and an emerging force for social justice in business).

The first homes under this new agreement were constructed in and around Managua in 2015, with plans to expand to municipalities throughout the country during the coming years. The Institute expanded capacity for the coming year by hiring an additional engineer, a new lawyer, and a communications specialist for the program. They have also forged partnerships with local builders and suppliers to reduce costs and increase speed of construction.

The Homes of Hope is a social enterprise, and once fully implemented will require no further outside funding to continue. The program embraces the business principals of efficiency and profitability to maximize the greater good by providing homes to those who could not otherwise afford them. In doing so, it has developed into a premier program for addressing the crippling housing crisis facing Nicaragua, and perhaps, we hope, a model for other groups around the world committed to stopping homelessness in their own communities.

Homes of Hope: After nearly twenty years of success in building homes for impoverished Nicaraguans, the next phase of our Homes of Hope program took form in 2015 because of the hard work of our partners and friends





Here at the Quixote Center we have been busy securing the funding necessary to "prime the pump" of this program. We have a goal of raising \$2 million. In 2015, we crossed the \$750,000 mark thanks to the commitment of some incredible people. Thank you!

# Haiti Reborn

In 2015, we purchased three additional acres of land for the Tet Mon model forest. This pushes the size of the forest to 47 acres of native born and grown trees. The forest has become a great asset to the region of Gros Morne



by improving the health of the soil, water, and air, and by becoming a recreational space for local residents to enjoy.

The satellite nurseries developed over the last two years are up and running strong, and have now distributed tens of thousands of trees to families across Gros Morne. These satellite nurseries are especially important to the more rural communities we work with, as their proximity improves the survival rate for the seedlings.

Training activities in 2015 included the "Goat Summit" training farmers in how to care for backyard goats and maximize their productivity. Farmers around the region learned valuable sustainable agriculture techniques. Students from the Green Schools Network joined the movement and learned about the invaluable functions of trees in the eco-system. Students also received fruit tree seedlings to take home and plant, with the hope that their families will benefit from the income that this new produce will generate.

# **Criminal Justice / GRIP**

In 2015, we continued partnering with the Grassroots Investigation Project (GRIP) to investigate cases of inmates on death row or serving life without parole, who are appealing the decisions in their cases. With the diligent efforts of our volunteers, Ericka Holland and Claudia Whitman, GRIP reviews dozens of calls from inmates and their families each month to assess the potential for further investigation into their cases. In many instances, GRIP is also able to provide information on resources available to the inmates or their families. Ericka has also begun research to update our Re-Entry database, an invaluable asset to the thousands of inmates released from prison each year with very little support.

# **Catholics Speak Out**

Catholics Speak Out's challenging commitment to expanding sensitivity to and the use of inclusive language was our guiding principle during 2015. We offered workshops on inclusivity at the June Intentional Eucharistic Communities Conference and at the September Women's Ordination Conference gathering. We also developed a workshop on "A Societal Examination of Conscience."

In the fall, CSO initiated a campaign to send "An Inclusive Bible to Every Bishop." There are roughly 250 bishops in the United States. We will be continuing this effort in 2016. Additionally, CSO is a constant participant in the umbrella group, Catholic Organizations for Renewal. Of course, CSO commented on the Pope's visit on our Quixote blog.

# **Administration**

The Quixote Center's technical infrastructure got a significant upgrade thanks to a generous donation from Art Milholland and Luann Mostello. Our office now includes updated computers and networks. In addition, our website and online databases have been upgraded, helping us to do a better job of communicating with our partners and supporters, as well as tracking project progress, leaving staff more time to engage directly with our projects.

# Conclusion

We have done all of this with the support of our grassroots network. Over the last 40 years, you have stood in solidarity with the Quixote Center to create significant and sustainable change in communities in Nicaragua, Haiti, and the United States.
